***** Your top five authors:


Stephen King, Edward Rutherfurd, Leon Uris, Alison Weir and Oscar Wilde.

I thought Charles Manson would escape prison and come for me that weekend. [Laughs]. I had quite the imagination when I was a teenager.

❖ Book that changed your life:

Trinity by Leon Uris. It opened my eyes to the Irish predicament, from which I'm descended. Even though the work is fictionalized, it is still the great novel about Ireland. If you had no passionate feelings about the Irish culture and their struggles before, you certainly will after reading this book. There are some parts of the book – taken straight from a page in history – that will outrage a person of Irish descent (the "Penal Laws," for example). Leon Uris brings to life this terrible struggle among the Irish people, not only for independence from the British but from their own inner battles about right and wrong, and their own morality.

* Favorite line from a book:

"Look at me, man, look at me and tell me I don't know what I'm about. I'm Conor Larkin. I'm an Irishman and I've had enough." - Leon Uris, *Trinity*.
